
READER'S GUIDE

- 6. Why does Grace return the ring to her aunt?

After you read

- 1. What is the author's message about family?
- 2. What role does Ma play in Grace's search?
- 3. How does Grace's relationship with her father change throughout the novel?
- 4. How does Grace's "angel mark" affect her sense of identity at different points in the novel?
- 5. What does Grace mean when she says, some secrets "are sweet little things that are simply too delicious to let slip"?
